Pause after each station to reflect and respond.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Are there actions or words that I have used to condemn or turn away from others?</li> <li>2. Think of what you “carry” that is a burden. How can you let go of some of this burden and allow God to help?</li> <li>3. When have you felt that you have “fallen” or failed? How did you get back up?</li> <li>4. Imagine you are Mary. What are you thinking and feeling?</li> <li>5. Who has helped you to “carry a cross” in your life? Did they do so willingly?</li> <li>6. Veronica stops to offer care and empathy for Jesus. How do you care for others?</li> <li>7. When have you felt like giving up but chose not to? What gave you strength?</li> <li>8. What sorrow do you see in the world? What is something you can do to help others experiencing this sorrow?</li> <li>9. Even when we fall or fail again and again, God still forgives us. Why does God continue to accept us even when we fail?</li> <li>10. Have you ever felt humiliated or embarrassed? Has anyone ever made fun of you because of your faith? How did you or would you respond?</li> <li>11. Life is precious. Do you sometimes take life and the good in life for granted? Explain.</li> <li>12. Jesus says “into your hands I commend my spirit” and lets go to God. What can you let go of and “give” to God to help you?</li> </ol>	 <p><i>Materials: black construction paper, white paper, paint, scissors</i></p> <p>Using a half sheet of paper, trace a scene from the stations of the cross as a silhouette. Cut the silhouette out of black paper. Next, paint a sunset onto the white paper.
